A Word from our Spiritual Director

To my friends of the TEC community

Greetings from the beautiful state of Nebraska! As you may have remembered from last summer, I am currently enrolled in a Master's program at Creighton University. This is the second of three summers and after next summer I will finish the courses needed to obtain a degree in Christian Spirituality. Please be assured of my prayers for you as I offer Mass and the Liturgy of the Hours each day.

I enjoy summer very much. For me summertime is always a great time to bask in the wonders of God. All you need to do is to simply look around you and see the amazing sights of the summer months. For example, we have longer days filled with sunshine (well ... at least a few of the days in Cleveland are filled with sunshine!), family gatherings, vacations, and of course a deeper awareness of God's ever constant presence.

At our TEC weekend we are reminded, during our commissioning ceremony, that: "God is counting on you —and we are counting on Him!" My friends, this summer I challenge you to rely more heavily on the Lord, and as you rely more heavily on the Lord I hope you will take advantage of the following disciplines: The first is spiritual reading. One of the gifts we have in the Church are the numerous spiritual writers we have access to (in school I will be spending lots of time reading these spiritual masters) but, I also encourage you to take advantage of the spiritual writers who have made our faith so rich and so accessible to us. I know that some of our parishes will be hosting our monthly FOPs, but many of our parishes have perpetual adoration or, if not perpetual adoration, many offer a period of adoration during the day. Take some time and adore our Eucharist Lord. What does one do in adoration? This can be answered by a peasant farmer who shared with St. John Vianney what he does in church before the tabernacle: "I look at our Good God and our Good God looks at me."

Summertime is a blessed time and an enjoyable time, and my prayer is that we all will take advantage of all of the many blessings God has given to us this summer.

Speaking of blessings, please keep in prayer the members of our community who have entered religious life, have been ordained, or have entered the seminary and continue to pursue God's call in their lives. The many vocations that have come from our community serve as one example of the many blessings God has bestowed upon us and the many blessings we, in turn, can share with others. Whether you're looking for a quick read or something with a little more theological depth, here are some new releases to add to your Reading List.

Something Other Than God: How I Passionately Sought Happiness and Accidentally Found It by Jennifer Fulwiler

Jennifer thought she was happy. She was raised in a happy (atheistic) family. She was recently married and had a great job, but one night she was overcome by the futility of her life. This spurred Jennifer to begin a covert faith journey which she kept hidden from her husband and all those close to her. "Just when Jennifer had a profound epiphany that gave her the courage to convert, she was diagnosed with a life-threatening medical condition-and the only treatment was directly at odds with the doctrines of her new-found faith. Something Other Than God is a poignant, profound, and often funny tale of one woman who set out to find the meaning of life and discovered that true happiness sometimes requires losing it all." (From the publisher's description.)

Angels and Saints: A Biblical Guide to Friendship with God's Holy Ones by Scott Hahn

Drawing on the Scriptures, Dr. Hahn illustrates how saints and angels make up a cloud of witnesses in heaven which surround the earthly church. The scope of saints covered in this book is as wide ranging and varied as the saints throughout the history of the church. It spans from "Moses and Mary to Augustine to Therese, and the first century to the last century." (From the publisher's description.) Since only saints can live in heaven, Dr. Hahn hopes to aid us in our heavenly goal by introducing us to some friends whom we can imitate and learn from along the way.

Jesus: A Pilgrimage by James Martin

If you're interested in traveling this summer but do not have the means to travel, consider going on pilgrimage to the Holy Land by reading Fr. James Martin, S.J.'s latest book. "Combining the fascinating insights of historical Jesus studies with profound spiritual insights about the Christ of faith, Father Martin recreates the world of first-century Galilee and Judea to usher you into Jesus's life and times and show readers how Jesus speaks to us today. Martin also brings together the most up-to-date Scripture scholarship, wise spiritual reflections, and lighthearted stories about traveling through the Holy Land with a fellow (and funny) Jesuit, visiting important sites in the life of Jesus of Nazareth." Fitness and Faith

Exercise is good for us. I know... Breaking news! Stop the presses! We all know that exercising has multiple benefits for our body; it helps in controlling our weight, combats health conditions and diseases, and improves our mood and energy levels. But did you know that many of the same approaches and rules of fitness and exercise can apply to our faith life?

Take reaching our goals, for example. Do you have a goal of running a 5K in a certain time, losing so many pounds, or fitting into clothes you haven't wore in a while? Do you have a goal of becoming a saint someday, being able to defend your faith better from a theological or philosophical perspective, or just want to understand more of the depths of our Church's history? Many times those goals don't happen overnight- so we train for them. I've heard it said that training is exercising with a purpose. So, instead of hopelessly wandering in the gym, do we develop a plan and persevere with discipline, getting back up when we fall, striving towards the goal? Do we read articles or books on topics we wish to learn? Do we train for heaven?

Or, how about warming up? Instead of lifting the heavy weight first, it's usually a good idea to complete a few lighter, warm-up sets to get the muscles ready. This can be applied to our prayer life. Perhaps as we enter into prayer, we can take 5-10 minutes to quiet our hearts and minds, find ourselves in the presence of God and His love for us, and then encounter Him deeper as the duration of our prayer continues. The examples can go on and on.

"No riches are greater than a healthy body; and no happiness than a joyful heart." Sirach 30:16. So as we take advantage of the multiple benefits exercise has for our physical body, may we recognize the truths that translate into to our relationship with God. And, may we train for heaven!



A NOTE FROM THE TEC BOARD

What do we do? Each board member has a specific role necessary to make TEC possible. We are comprised of some are traditional board roles; a treasurer, a chairperson, and a secretary. Some of our roles are not so traditional; the spiritual director, and teen representatives. It is very important that we have strong teen representation as we are Teens Encounter Christ.

Do you pick the teams that work the weekends? No. The discernment committee does that. The discernment committee is made up of a few board members and a few team members who worked the previous TEC. They pray for guidance from the Holy Spirit and prayerfully select each team.

Each member of the board serves out of our love for God and TEC and what it has brought to our lives, the lives of our families, and all of you. We hope that you take advantage of the events related to TEC weekends (working a weekend or attending reunion) or the other events we offer like FOP's, the picnic, the FEST, the fundraiser, etc. We welcome any suggestions you have to make TEC a stronger more vibrant community.
